Meet Dr. William C. Davis, Scientist Inspired by George Washington Carver March 17 – 24, 2007 Hosted by Reflections In Black Museum, Inc.



Dr. William C. Davis, Ph.D., M.T., is an African-American Scientist. Presently he is the Chairman of the Natural Science Department, at St. Philip's College in San Antonio, Texas. Dr. Davis is also a Professor and has taught for over 20 years.

Dr. Davis studied under George Washington Carver. Like George Washington Carver, Dr. Davis, found innovative uses for food crops. In 1959, Dr. Davis invented instant potatoes while doing research at the University of Idaho. In 1962, he discovered a sugar called "Stractan" (arabogalactan) which is a sap extracted from wood that gives a smooth texture to creamy frozen desserts. More recently, Dr. Davis invented "kinetic water" and magic glue.

Dr. Davis will be on tour in Ohio, visiting schools and local business representatives and other places of interest. The tour will be hosted by Reflections In Black Museum, Inc.: African American History On Wheels, a non-profit organization.
