

SPC honors the life of Dr. William C. Davis

St. Philip's College Professor Emeritus Dr. William Conan Davis passed away on March 16, 2022, at the age of 95. Friends and family of Dr. Davis joined the college community for a reception on April 14 to celebrate his life and legacy.

Dr. Davis led a remarkable career as a researcher, food chemist and educator. His career was set in motion when his father took him on a road trip from the family's home in Valdosta, Georgia, to the Tuskegee Institute in Alabama. There, the young Davis attended a workshop with George Washington Carver and Henry Ford. Seeing African American professors and scientists in action inspired Davis to become a chemist.

Dr. Davis created instant mash potatoes, soft-serve ice cream and industrial glue. He standardized medical tests for insulin and growth hormones. Working with a St. Philip's College colleague, Dr. Lanier Byrd, Dr. Davis studied the characteristics of drinking water and co-created the formula for Dasani brand water. William Conan Davis was born on August 22, 1926, in Waycross, Georgia to Kince Charles and Laura Jane Davis. He graduated from a segregated high school and went to New York City to further his education. He lived with his brother, the late actor and civil rights activist, Ossie Davis, and briefly attended the City College of New York.

Davis went on to earn a Bachelor of Science degree in Chemistry from Talladega College (Ala.) in 1956 and a Master's of Science in Organic Chemistry from the Tuskegee Institute in 1958, where he was a George Washington Carver Research Fellow.

He was determined to pursue a Ph.D. in research—an extremely difficult goal for a black student at the time. The University of Idaho was the only institution willing to accept him as a research-track grad student. He was the first African American to earn a doctoral degree from the university. His thesis was A Study of Sloughing in the Potato Tuber (1965).

With a Ph.D. in hand, Dr. Davis began to explore human health, studying hay fever antigens, learning radioimmunoassay techniques, and spent nearly 15 years as director of United Medical Laboratories in Portland, Oregon. He helped establish a free medical clinic in Portland's Albina neighborhood before relocating to San Antonio,

A ceremony for the new Welding and Auto Collision Center will be held later this year. As we approach our quasquicentennial, we acknowledge that Legacy Day has been 125 years in the making. The work goes on today and will continue as the college's future stewards guide it through this century and beyond.

Texas. From 1979 to 1982, Davis was a research associate in Molecular Pharmacology at the University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio and, in 1983, he became a chemistry professor at St. Philip's College. Dr. Davis served as department chair of Natural Sciences, starting in 1996. He was named professor emeritus upon his retirement in 2009. On the day of his retirement, Dr. Davis awarded the college a \$20,000 endowment toward scholarships for science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) students. In 2012, the college science building was named in his honor, the William C. Davis Science Building. Davis enrolled in the U.S. Army Officer Training Corps while a student at Talladega College. Commissioned as a Second Lieutenant, he served during the Korean War and was awarded with a Purple Heart in 1953. He interred at Fort Sam Houston Cemetery in San Antonio.



In a lunchtime ceremony, the After-School All-Stars Alamo City recognized Dr. Loston as a Superhero for her leadership in education. Alamo Colleges District Board Chair Dr. Gene Sprague and ACD Chancellor Mike Flores introduced Dr. Loston to an audience that included the St. Philip's College leadership team.

St. Philip's College student, Minh Ngo, was selected as the March 2022 Districtwide AlamoPROMISE Student of the Month. He was recognized during the March 22, 2022 Alamo Colleges District Board of Trustees Meeting.

Minh is a student in the Health and Biosciences AlamoINSTITUTE. He is currently enrolled in the Histologic Technician Program and is a student member of the Texas Society for Histotechnology. Originally from Vietnam, Minh graduated from Judson High School in 2020. He first learned about SPC's Histologic Program from his high school science teacher. He became invested in it as his future after visiting the program during a field trip to SPC. Upon his return home, he worked hard and dedicated himself to doing everything he needed to do to gain acceptance to SPC and then the Histologic Technician Program. He is very grateful to have learned about the program through his high school science teacher because he did not know about any laboratory occupations when he was in Vietnam.

Minh finds it fascinating to study the tissues and observe them under a microscope and is working very hard to become a certified technician. His professor, Lucila Escobedo, describes him as "a great team member who has learned quickly and excelled in the basic techniques of the Histology profession." She does not doubt that he will be a great Histology Technician and an asset to the Histology community.

AlamoPROMISE distinguished students are nominated by their college faculty and staff and meet eligibility requirements, including being in good standing with the College and having a minimum 3.0 GPA.

SPC HIT program named 'Best in the South'

St. Philip's College Health Information Technology Program was ranked #4 in the nation by Intelligent.com for having one of the Best Registered Health Information Technician degree programs in 2022. SPC was also named "Best in the South." Over 150 college and university HIT programs were evaluated, 27 were included on the list. Rankings are calculated through a scoring system that reviews student engagement, potential return on investment, curriculum quality, graduation rate, reputation, postgraduate employment, and leading thirdparty evaluations. "The success of the HIT Program is a result of having a strong and collaborative team that supports SPC's missions and values in giving back to the community," Program Director, Beatrice Avila. Avila has been with Alamo Colleges District since 2005.

There are currently three faculty members who hold elected positions within local organizations: Beatrice Avila is Texas Health Information Management Association (HIMA) Board Education Committee Chair; Patricia Lamson is Texas HIMA Board Marketing Chair; Cecario Guerrero is Alamo HIMA Board President-Elect. All three faculty members are SPC alumni.

The mission of the Health Information Technology program is to provide an environment fostering excellence in technical achievement while remaining responsive to the needs of the community. The program offers an Associate of Applied Science in Health Information Technology. Graduates work in hospitals, long-term care facilities, health insurance companies, state and local government healthcare agencies, and other companies that provide patient care services.



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HAPPY 109th BIRTHDAY GERTHA MURPHY

At 109-years-old, Gertha Lockett Murphy is the St. Philip's College and Alamo Colleges District (ACD) oldest-living alumni. Murphy was born on May 20, 1913, in Goodwill, Texas, a small community in Washington County. She is the daughter of late farmers and the granddaughter of a former U.S. slave. Murphy graduated from St. Philip's in 1936 and worked in civil service for 27 years at Kelly Air Force Base. At the age of 60, she earned a bachelor's degree in early childhood education from the University of the Incarnate Word.

In 2019, the college honored and celebrated Murphy with a 106th birthday bash hosted by SPC President Dr. Adena Williams Loston. ACD Chancellor Mike Flores, SPC employees and Murphy's loved ones attended the event. In 2020, more than 100 cars participated in a car parade to wish her happy birthday. The car parade included the San Antonio Fire Department, San Antonio Police Department and Bexar County Sheriff's Office. Murphy has met every one of the college's presidents, including President Emeritus Artemisia Bowden. During an interview in 2019, Murphy expressed her biggest life lessons: do the right thing, mind your own business, pray a lot, and be kind to people.

awareness of HBCUs and award a scholarship to an HBCU with the funds raised. Members of the PanHellenic Council have a healthy competition among the 9 Greek Letter Fraternity and Sororities that comprise the council. The winning Greek Letter organization selects the HBCU to receive the scholarship, this year's winner was Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc. who chose St. Philip's College, their adopted HBCU since 2019.

Annual scholarship golf tournament yields \$130,000

St. Philip's College hosted its 13th Annual Scholarship Golf Tournament at the Quarry Golf Course. The event raised over \$130,000 in student scholarships. The financial contributions fund Presidential Scholarships. The funds also support Student Engagement Grants that provide opportunities for faculty and staff to create projects aimed at engaging students in campus programs. As a primary funding source, contributions from the tournament are vital in helping St. Philip's strengthen the lives of students, their families and our community. During the Texas Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) conference held in early March, the Texas Region recognized the St. Philip's College Psi Kappa Chapter with five awards: Hall of Honor for Outstanding Members, Distinguished Officer Team, Distinguished Member (Janel Sohl), Best Digital Yearbook Award, Hall of Honor for Outstanding Advisors (Tyrell Williams), and the Horizon Award (Tyrell Williams). The conference was held March 10-12 in Frisco.

The Distinguished Officer Team award recognizes PTK officers for their exceptional atmosphere of teamwork, leadership abilities, promotion of Honors in Action, and engagement in the Society and the Texas Region. SPC Named Among Top 10 Most Affordable HBCUs

St. Philip's College was ranked among the top 10 most affordable Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCU) by Student Loan Hero. The College ranks ninth among all institutions and number one in Texas for affordability. With a yearly net cost-of-attendance of \$6,250, it also ranks the third lowest in student loan debt among graduates from HBCUs.

Student Loan Hero researchers reviewed Department of Education College Scorecard data, using average annual net costs, which include tuition, room, board, and books, to determine most and least affordability. Student Loan Hero was founded in 2012 to help student loan borrowers organize, manage, and repay their student loan debt through smarter and more informed decisions.

Today, there are over 100 HBCUs across the U.S. granting degrees to students of all racial and ethnic backgrounds. St. Philip's College is one of nine HBCUs in Texas. The College has been recognized as one of the fastest growing HBCUs, as mentioned in a December 2021 article by the Business Journal.

CultureFest Brings Fiesta to San Antonio's Eastside

After pausing the party for two years due to the pandemic, the St. Philip's College CultureFest and Rib-Cook-off was back for the Fiesta season. The official Fiesta San Antonio event is the biggest Fiesta celebration on San Antonio's Eastside. The opening ceremony featured remarks from Dr. Loston, Alamo Colleges District Board Chair Dr. Gene Sprague, District 2 Trustee Gloria Ray, Miss San Antonio 2022 Elaina McCoulskey, and 436th District Court Judge William "Cruz" Shaw. Fiesta San Antonio Commission Leadership presented the college with a Participating Member Organization Certificate for its commitment to the Fiesta mission in presenting a safe, educational, annual celebration of the diverse heritage, culture and spirit of San Antonio. The festival featured live music, food, dance, games, a car show sponsored by the Automotive Department and Jordan Ford, and a celebrityjudged rib competition managed by SPC culinary faculty and students. The event also included a raffle for three BBQ grills made by welding students at Southwest campus.

Students attend first-ever Texas HBCU Conference

Members of Texas' historically Black colleges and universities gathered for the inaugural Texas HBCU Conference held at Huston-Tillotson University in Austin. The conference focused on topics surrounding structural problems in higher education and how to better serve students from historically-marginalized communities.

The event featured speeches from campus leaders, conversations with state lawmakers who represent HBCUs in their districts, and a roundtable discussion with students who spoke about the experiences and challenges of attending HBCUs. Students and community members from seven HBCUs in Texas — Jarvis Christian College; Prairie View A&M University; St. Philip's College; Southwestern Christian College; Texas Southern University; Wiley College and Huston-Tillotson University — attended.

"The HBCU Conference was an amazing experience and so informative. I enjoyed learning about the history of our college and meeting some amazing and powerful individuals," said student Pedro Titsworth.

Dr. Gloria M. Jackson led St. Philip's College from 1982 to 1984. St. Philip's College celebrated her contributions and service on May 20, 2022, the day of her 91st birthday. Dr. Jackson joined SPC as an assistant professor in the Business Department. She later became department chair and held various leadership positions. She was selected as President of St. Philip's College and led for two years. She left St. Philip's in 1984 to work for ACCD Chancellor Dr. Byron McClenney on special projects, including the opening of Palo Alto College in 1985. Dr. Jackson found that she missed teaching and interacting with students, so she took a faculty position at San Antonio College. Her retirement in 1999, marked her 50th year in education.
