




In Our Community







AlamoPROMISE: 5-Year Education Impact



Target increase in overall college going rate from 49% pre-PROMISE to 70% in Year 5.



Projected total net increase in college-going students over five years: 19,085 new students, doubling the total enrollment of new students over five years.





AlamoPROMISE: 5-Year Economic Impact



12,013 jobs created due to direct impacts



Over 5,000 additional jobs due to indirect and induced impacts



\$728 million in overall growth in labor income



\$962 million in additional economic activity



Equivalent to 1% of local GDP







AlamoPROMISE: 5-Year Economic Impact

Over a five-year period, beginning in Fall 2020, AlamoPROMISE could generate as much \$1.69 billion dollars in economic output.
