Attended by San Antonio Mayor, The Honorable Ivy Taylor, the program increased the capacity of grant writers and partners in the Promise Zone of San Antonio.

Attendees learned strategies to enhance community and organizational development and the art of successful capacity building and grant writing for their organizations from HUD professional staff. The HUD Center for Faith-Based and Neighborhood Partnerships has hosted similar trainings across the country.

SPC student recognized at Texas Business Hall of Fame Foundation

Steele High School Team Wins for 'Best Tasting Salsa'

SPC celebrated student success during the college's 2016 Best Tasting Salsa Scholarship Competition. The salsa specialty food contest, featuring student chefs from Steele, McCollum, Clemens, La Vernia, Sam Houston, Brandeis, Taft and Cole high schools, included scholarships for half of the eight two-person teams. Steele (Shukira Al-Ara-Ibi, Ty Craighead), Taft (Tiffany Arand, Jose Reyes), La Vernia (Dustin Norman, Aubrey Stewart), and Brandeis high schools placed first, second, third and people's choice (Alex Vargas, Allison Kirby) respectively. Each of the 16 competing chefs is both a high school senior and interested in attending St. Philip's College. What distinguishes the food is that it is from a region where the family and commercial traditions of salsa making extend centuries deep, and new generations create the authentic salsas of the future during the contest. The college's signature Hispanic Heritage Month event features industry sponsorship and local chefs as judges. All salsas are entirely prepared in labs at SPC on competition day. Intensive preparation lasts one hour. Table set up precedes the judging, public viewing, and sampling. Teams of chefs are judged on presentation, originality, creativity, salsa taste and texture. The winning entry was Kiwi Avocado Salsa Verde.

National Hispanic Recognition Program honors for two SPC Early College High School students

Two SPC Early College High School students within the Comal Independent School District are SPC's first from that district to be recognized in a 23-year-old College Board non-monetary award program that identifies outstanding Hispanic high school students.

In September, Keaton Rodriguez and Alfred Martinez became Memorial Early College High School's first-ever National Hispanic Recognition Program Honorees. A local television reporter interviewed both in October.

"If you're recognized as a National Hispanic Scholar, there's a lot of scholarships you can get," Martinez told the reporter. He aspires to study biology at Harvard University or Yale University.

Rodriguez aspires to become an engineer after studying at the University of Texas at San Antonio or elsewhere in the UT System. "I love making things work. I look at a car, and I look at the engine, and I love how all these mechanical parts are specially designed to do their specific tasks. I want to be able to design things like that."

The program annually identifies 5,000 of the highest scoring students from a nationwide total of 250,000 high school juniors who both took the PSAT/NMSQT and designated themselves as Hispanic.

HBCU All Star completes training in Washington

SPC student Damon Lake recently completed a week of leadership training for a year of public service aimed at helping officials in The White House and at the U.S. Department of Education to advance academic excellence at historically black colleges. The White House Initiative on Historically Black Colleges and Universities HBCU All-Stars program supports the goal of helping 60 percent of Americans ages 25-34 complete an associate degree or higher by 2020.



Members of the SPC delegation hosted by the White House Initiative staff and the President's Board of Advisors on Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) at the 2016 National HBCU Week Conference included college director of student conduct and Title IX John Martin, SPC vice president of student success Dr. Mordecai Ian Brownlee, SPC President Dr. Adena Williams Loston, HBCU All Star Damon Lake, SPC vice president of college services Lacy Hampton, SPC Title III director Dr. Erick Akins, and Monica Aguilar, Title III Grant Management.

"You cannot buy this. The leadership training was phenomenal. My takeaway was fantastic," Lake, a business major, said. "It was 'wow' moment after 'wow' moment for me. We were

literally immersed in brand management for HBCUs and who we are. I have a fact-based depth of understanding of the role of the HBCU in this country." Lake is the second All-Star from SPC in this three-year old program after competing initial formal training during the 2016 National Historically Black Colleges and Universities Week Conference Oct. 23-26 in Washington, D.C. SPC leaders at The White House as part of the 2016 National HBCU Week Conference activities that included observing the 2016 HBCU All Stars in training included SPC President Dr. Adena Williams Loston, Lacy Hampton, the SPC Vice President of College Services, Dr. Mordecai Brownlee, the SPC vice president of student success, and Dr. Erick Akins, the SPC Title III Director.

"Most of the leaders on the federal level who were presenting as moderators were HBCU grads, and they had amazing federal track records," Lake explained. "To see so many leaders who were once where I am, doing what they are doing, opened a place in my mind. It's important to see people who both look like you and have gone to the top, and it opened my mind in a way that has never been opened before. Getting a chance to meet and mingle with the All Stars, to see how I stand in the leadership ranks, was quite impressive. I was born in 1987, the same year St. Philip's College became an HBCU member institution, so I'm doubly proud to be an All Star when my college observes its 30th anniversary status year."

HBCU Grants for SPC announced

The U.S. Department of Education announced that SPC is among 95 Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs), strengthening their academic resources, financial management systems, endowment-building capacity and physical plants as a result of grants awarded to the college.

The five-year grant was awarded in 2012. SPC's funding for the fifth year is \$4,990,765. Activities at SPC enhanced under the grant are student services, centers of excellence in mathematics and science; instructional labs; campus renovation; information and communication technology; institutes for teaching excellence and staff development and a veterans outreach and transition center.

The \$1,322,023 Student Aid and Financial Responsibility Act Funding grant awarded to SPC will fund the remainder of a \$10 million renovation at the 63-year-old Turbon Student Center, constructed in 1953, renovated in 1976 and 1996 and named for Professor/Director Of Counseling Emeritus Everett L. Turbon (1919-2002).

Hernandez-Castillo shared her wisdom in a Hispanic Heritage Month program, "Making Your Mess into a Message: Learn How I Survived Domestic Violence and Found Love, Hope, and Purpose." The event helped SPC students reflect on the college's commitment to providing a supportive learning environment and to fostering, safe, healthy relationships among its students. Symposium held for third CIMA-LSAMP Project Undergraduate Research Program

SPC hosted the completion symposium for the third annual Ciencia, Ingenieria, y Matematicas Aliados – Louis Stokes Alliance Minority Participation Program (CIMA-LSAMP) undergraduate research cohort that included five SPC students, as part of a national effort to increase the completion rates of minority STEM majors by pairing promising community college students with faculty mentors and their projects at universities. Partners with SPC in this grant are Palo Alto College, Northwest Vista College, Northeast Lakeview College, San Antonio College, St. Mary's University, the University of Texas at San Antonio and Texas A&M University – San Antonio. More than 30 students completed research projects under the mentorship of STEM instructors and professors.

Researchers included current and former SPC students Diona Morgan, an engineering major who completed research at SPC; Desiree Ortega, a biology major who completed her research at Texas A&M University – San Antonio; Carina Rodriguez, a biology major who completed her research at TAMUSA; Valeria Saenz, an engineering major who completed her research at SPC; and Mia Wright, a biology major who completed her research at St. Mary's University.

Triniti Armstrong Texas High School Aerospace Scholars achievement

St. Philip's College Early College High School with San Antonio Independent School District student Triniti Armstrong made college history as the first student at the college selected by NASA to participate in the preliminary online distance learning portion of the space agency's Texas High School Aerospace Scholars (HAS) program.

"I used to attend the San Antonio Prefreshman Engineering Program and I couldn't make it one year, so I found something new to do with the NASA program," said Armstrong. NASA's program is geared toward physics students in their junior year. Armstrong hopes to be invited to participate the onsite summer program, however she shares she is concentrating on the present, and having fun with the NASA coursework as she aspires to become an aerospace engineer.

"So far it has been something great to do. I talk with NASA about using 3-D imaging, designing airplanes and space ships while I'm taking their course. If my grades are high enough I can get to go to NASA, but first I have to complete four weekly assignments with a test each month. The course work is really broad, because there are STEM modules you complete, and the science you study includes satellites and wing shapes, in addition to an assignment to write a paper about the kind of NASA technology you'd use to help NASA get answers to their questions," Armstrong said.

Eight SPC students study in Paris

Eight SPC students participated in the college's second transatlantic culinary exchange program Sept. 17-30 with the Lycee Guillaume Tirel culinary school in Paris. Under the leadership of college faculty member Chef Frank Salinas, SPC students Allison Ansley (baking and pastry arts), Yolanda Guerra (baking and pastry arts), Sabrina Perez (culinary arts), April Santos (culinary arts), Louise Slone (culinary arts), Anthony Sund (culinary arts), Victoria Tovar (culinary arts) and Kayla Waters (culinary arts) prepared foods from Texas for Parisians in celebration of the Lycee's tenth anniversary and France's 2016 Gastronomy Week observances.

Foreign delegations of students from Germany, Canada, China, Cuba, Spain, Italy, Mexico, and Portugal also came to support a program that stressed importance of international trade.

Reunions were held with the 12 French students SPC hosted during Fiesta week. Six second-year SPC students, two near-second-year SPC students and one SPC culinary arts alumni represented San Antonio.



SPC celebrated student success and globalism as the college's students and faculty served diplomacy abroad as participants in the college's second transatlantic culinary exchange program visit Sept. 17-30 with the Lycee Guillaume Tirel culinary school in Paris. Eight SPC College students and college faculty member Chef Frank Salinas learned and represented America by sharing foods from Texas with the people of Paris in celebration of the Lycee's tenth anniversary and France's 2016 Gastronomy Week observances. By global culinary education standards, the exchange is a premier partnership, Salinas explained. The two-year-old exchange that has included students from Paris attending SPC in San Antonio is recognized as a best practice by Dr. Jill Biden, noted community college subject matter expert and spouse of U.S. Vice President Joe Biden.

Jessica's Project Series Fifth Anniversary with Maria Davis

HIV/AIDS disease prevention activist Maria Davis helped St. Philip's College students conclude the fall lineup of three Jessica's Project Series Fifth Anniversary activities. The Nov. 29 program coincided with World AIDS Day observances.

"This has been a long journey, and I want to thank all the students who reached out to me through social media, aggressively looking for me," Davis shared with a group of students and local experts in the AIDS prevention effort. "It is so important to talk and communicate and spread the word that HIV is connected to so many things.... molestation, domestic violence, social media and bullying... please find someone who can help others so they do not suffer in silence," said Davis.

A student-led presentation of nutrition-based solutions for diseases suffered by persons in San Antonio has been the signature event of this series each year since 2012. Because the college is a lead partner in a multi-year federal capacity building grant for AIDS prevention, students and grant partners were event co-participants with Davis, explained college biology faculty member Dr. Solomon Nfor and Thermajeon Jones, the

college Community Empowerment Project leader.

The remainder of Jessica's Project season five included 150 nutrition students and many local residents sharing knowledge on Nov. 18 in the St. Philip's College-East Side Community garden. All efforts were part of the college's larger commitment to transforming socio-economic-educational conditions for residents surrounding its main campus, Nfor explained. While community partners in the garden events included Green Spaces Alliance and Antioch Transformational Network Inc., community partners in the AIDS prevention event included San Antonio AIDS Foundation (SAAF), San Antonio Fighting Back, San Antonio Metropolitan Health STD/HIV Clinic and Beat AIDS.

"Maria Davis inspired us to include dozens of our social and behavioral science students in this fact-based experience for the first time, so that all of our students could experience her unique and highly valuable wisdom," said Nfor. "STEM professionals can create all the technical advances in the prevention of AIDS, but without well-informed social scientists on the team,

those advances are less likely to reach the most vulnerable. We thank Maria Davis and the San Antonio AIDS prevention partners in advance for helping our college to diversify its efforts in disease prevention and the creation of a culture of health," said Nfor.
