SPC Awarded \$20,000 from Home Depot® Retool Your School

St. Philip's College is among 30 Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) to win the 2021 Home Depot "Retool Your School" competition. The college led an eight-week social media-driven campaign that relied on tweets and Instagram posts using #SPC_RYS21 and voting on the Retool Your School website.

The program, spearheaded by The Home Depot®, is aimed at giving back. According to the company's website, the Retool Your School Program has provided more than \$3.1 million in campus improvement grants to allow HBCUs to make sustainable improvements to their campuses since 2009.

HBCU students, alumni, and advocates were encouraged to

cast votes for the HBCU of their choice. HBCUs were separated into three clusters based on student population. The top ten schools with the most votes per cluster were selected to receive grants ranging from \$20,000 to \$75,000.

The desired space that St. Philip's plans to remodel is located in the Watson Fine Arts Center. The Art Department plans to create an exhibit space to showcase student artwork and an intimate venue for art exhibits, spoken word poetry and small live music performances—an experiential working space for students, by students.

While our current circumstances require us to celebrate in a manner different than we had anticipated, our pride in our students remains constant.

The tools our graduates have called upon on their academic journey will directly impact their families, professions, and our community.

San Antonio Mayor Ron Nirenberg hosted the UNCF (United Negro College Fund) 12th Annual Mayor's Luncheon. Event host Winell Herron - Executive Vice President; HEB Public Affairs, Diversity, and Environmental Affairs - recognized Dr. Adena Williams Loston as the 2021 Excellence in Education Honoree. The award celebrates individuals who have led the charge in championing a quality education for all. Music Major Performs with 105 Voices in History

To commemorate the 90th anniversary of the adoption of "The Star-Spangled Banner" as the U.S. national anthem, the U.S. Navy Band joined forces with 105 Voices of History, the only national choir for students from Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCU).

The recording featured 128 voices from HBCUs all across the nation with members of the U.S. Navy Band. St. Philip's College was represented by music major Yvette Hardin in the nationwide virtual performance. The performance premiered on 105 Voices of History TV via YouTube. The project is part of the ongoing Navy Band tradition of conducting masterclasses, mock auditions and performing as musical guests with HBCUs.

"It was an honor to take part in this historic event. Joining students from different HBCUs felt special; I gained a new family," said Yvette.

Hardin is no stranger to a grand stage. In 2019 she performed during the St. Philip's College Fall commencement ceremony. Most recently, she participated as a cast member of "Bad Mama Jama Remix: Let the Record Show". The sold-out show took place at Little Carver Theatre in March.



SPC Hosts Living In My Skin Panel Discussion

St. Philip's College President Dr. Adena Williams Loston hosted a Living in My Skin Panel Discussion as part of the 2021 Black History Month observance. Living in My Skin featured over 30 oil-on-linen portraits by Lionel Sosa of Black men, ages 10 to 90, as well as a two-part documentary that premiered on KLRN.

Dr. Loston joined Executive Producer Brandon Logan, Director Lionel Sosa, and documentary features Bishop David M. Copeland from New Creation Christian Fellowship and 4-Star U.S. Air Force General Edward A. Rice, Jr. (retired) in a discussion moderated by St. Philip's College Fine Arts & Kinesiology Chair, Vincent Hardy. Panelists discussed today's reality of what it is like to be a Black man or boy in San Antonio and the importance of bringing a better understanding of each other as a community.

SPC's Phi Theta Kappa Chapter Earns REACH Rewards Membership Recognition



In February, St. Philip's College Psi Kappa Chapter of Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) was recognized by the Recognizing Excellence in Acceptance and Completion with Honors Rewards (REACH). The REACH Rewards program celebrates the recruitment efforts of chapters that are growing in membership. St. Philip's $\Phi\Theta\Kappa$ Chapter is one of 1,081 that received this distinction. The Chapter's distinction provides free PTK graduation stoles to chapter officers and members in celebration of the membership milestone.

"Our $\Phi\Theta\Kappa$ leadership team is invested in our student's futures offering them opportunities to be engaged within the Chapter, college, and the community. This provides invaluable experiences and connections that are essential to their academic and professional growth. In 2020, our Chapter's Acceptance Rate of 21% reflected our student's persistence and grit. Students are committed to completing their college credentials and $\Phi\Theta\Kappa$ is one step in the right direction. We are truly honored and humbled for

this recognition," said $\Phi\Theta\Kappa$ Advisor, Maria Botello.

The St. Philip's College Psi Kappa Chapter of Phi Theta Kappa was established in 1972 and has held a Five Star Chapter status for 10 years in a row –an award that honors community service commitment. During the 2019-2020 academic year, students contributed over 1,000 volunteer hours toward organizations across the city. Additional Chapter accolades at a regional level include Friend of Texas Award, Hall of Honor, Horizon Award – Distinguished Advisor, Most Distinguished Advisor for the Texas Region, Scholarship Hallmark Award, Regional Milestone Award, Distinguished Chapter Member Award, Yearbook Award, Top 3 Chapter for 2012, Icarus Award, Texas Awards, Hallmark Service Award, and All-Texas Academic Team. Awards at an international level include, Distinguished Member Award, Top 100 Chapter Recognition, Distinguished Honors in Action Project Award, and Five Star Level recognition.

Four SPC Students Named to 2021 All-Texas Academic Team

St. Philip's College Phi Theta Kappa ($\Phi\Theta\Kappa$) students Alexandra Williams, Cole Gavlick, Malia Mikol, and Morgan Hutcheson were selected to represent St. Philip's as part of the All-Texas Academic Team. The program works in conjunction with the Texas Association of Community Colleges and $\Phi\Theta\Kappa$ to honor academic excellence and community involvement.

Each year, approximately 100 community college students are selected from 50 community college districts in Texas to be honored as members of the All-Texas Academic Team. Students are nominated by faculty members and selections are based on academic achievement, community service, leadership, and expression. Since a 3.5 GPA is required when applying, the extra work and community service outside of their courses play an important role in selection.



63% of students indicate that it is important to them to **SUPPORT THEIR FAMILY FINANCIALLY** while in school




62% of students said their **FAMILY'S FINANCES HAVE WORSENERD** since before the COVID-19 pandemic

70% of students say they **WOULD USE FINANCIAL SUPPORT** services if offered by their school




68% of students say they would have **TROUBLE GETTING \$500** in cash or credit to meet an unexpected need within the next month
